## Who Was the Real Snow White?

Snow White's real name was Blanche Neige and she was born<sup>2</sup> in New York<sup>10</sup> on 14th February, 1904<sup>8</sup>. She got the nickname<sup>16</sup> Snow White<sup>4</sup> when<sup>8</sup> she<sup>4</sup> was very young because<sup>9</sup> of her pale<sup>15</sup>, white skin.<sup>11</sup> She loved<sup>2</sup> to sing and entertain her parents<sup>4</sup> at<sup>10</sup> their<sup>4</sup> beautiful<sup>14</sup> family home as a



little girl<sup>8</sup>. The three were<sup>2</sup> wonderfully<sup>14</sup> happy together but sadly her mother Beatrice died at the age of only 30. Her father Benedict was heartbroken<sup>16</sup> and Snow White was miserable so<sup>9</sup> they<sup>4</sup> looked after each other for<sup>8</sup> a few<sup>5</sup> years.

Mr Neige<sup>4</sup> decided<sup>17</sup> to get married<sup>2</sup> again after<sup>8</sup> he<sup>4</sup> met a glamorous<sup>14</sup> woman called Maledicta. Snow White mistrusted<sup>13</sup> her new stepmother<sup>4</sup> as<sup>9</sup> she<sup>4</sup> treated other people unkindly<sup>13&14</sup>.<sup>11</sup>

"I'm<sup>2</sup> the classiest<sup>14</sup> woman in New York."<sup>12</sup> she boasted to everyone<sup>4</sup> but they<sup>4</sup> all liked Snow White better. Maledicta decided<sup>17</sup> to get rid of her stepdaughter<sup>16</sup>. On June 8th, 1924<sup>8</sup> she instructed her bodyguard<sup>16</sup> to take Snow White to the river<sup>10</sup> and shoot her!

Luckily<sup>9</sup> he<sup>4</sup> couldn't do it<sup>2</sup> so instead he left Snow White alone by the docks<sup>10</sup>. She has said that she was so<sup>2&3</sup> unhappy<sup>13</sup> at that moment<sup>8</sup> she nearly drowned herself. She was then<sup>8</sup> saved by the sound of music from<sup>10</sup> a<sup>5</sup> nearby jazz club. She entered the club to ask<sup>2</sup> for help where<sup>10</sup> the musicians<sup>16</sup> took pity on her.<sup>11</sup> The Seven Jazzmen<sup>4</sup> invited her to stay but said she'd have to be their<sup>4</sup> singer. A reporter<sup>4&5</sup> from the New York Times<sup>10</sup> called Jon Draper<sup>4</sup> heard<sup>17</sup> her and fell in love with

her fabulous voice. **Afterwards**<sup>8</sup> he wrote an<sup>5</sup> article about this amazing new<sup>15</sup> singing sensation<sup>14</sup> and soon<sup>8</sup> she was famous<sup>17</sup> all over the city. Her stepmother<sup>16</sup> pretended to be pleased but really she was furious<sup>17</sup>! She held<sup>2</sup> a grand party on New Year's Day 1925<sup>8</sup> to celebrate Snow White's success. Maledicta gave

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<sup>8</sup> uses conjunctions, adverbs and prepositions to show time, e.g. later, yesterday Snow White a cocktail with a poisonous cherry in it during the party<sup>8</sup>. Snow White collapsed as soon as she drank it<sup>8&11</sup> and the paramedics<sup>16</sup> couldn't revive her.

The whole of New York<sup>4</sup> was devastated by<sup>9</sup> the loss. Her friends the Jazzmen<sup>4</sup> carried the glass coffin into the church<sup>10</sup> at her funeral<sup>8</sup> but they<sup>4</sup> were so upset that they stumbled and bumped it on the ground.<sup>11</sup> Onlookers<sup>4&16</sup> were amazed when Snow White<sup>8</sup> opened her eyes.<sup>11</sup> Doctors realised that the cherry had only been<sup>2</sup> stuck in her throat<sup>10</sup> and the knock released it<sup>2</sup>. Jon Draper told the police<sup>4</sup> about the poison and they<sup>4</sup> arrested Maledicta and she was sent to prison<sup>10</sup> for 10 years<sup>8</sup>.

Snow White and Jon<sup>4</sup> married<sup>2</sup> after<sup>8</sup> he became the band's manager<sup>4</sup>. The couple<sup>4</sup> and the Seven Jazzmen travelled the world and made<sup>2&15</sup> many hit recordings. Maledicta<sup>4</sup> wrote to Snow White from jail<sup>10</sup> and apologised<sup>16</sup> for her<sup>4</sup> jealous behaviour and she became<sup>2</sup> the singer's biggest<sup>9</sup> fan once she was released from prison.

Snow White has<sup>283</sup> often<sup>17</sup> been called the greatest singer of the 1920s<sup>8</sup> and her records are<sup>2</sup> still popular<sup>17</sup> today.

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
