## Dear Parents/Carers

As you may already be aware, the Department for Education has announced changes to Relationship, Health and Sex Education (RHSE) following a nationwide consultation. These changes need to be in effect by the summer term, when all schools are required to comply with the updated requirements. We are keen to share our plans with you and understand your views on it.

The main change is the RHSE, or PHSCE (Personal, Health, Social and Citizenship Education) as it is also known, has largely become a compulsory, foundation subject so it is now part of the National Curriculum which all schools need to follow. The only part of the RHSE which is not compulsory is the sex education element. This is taught in Maple Class and parents/carers are given the opportunity to view the resources prior to the teaching of the lessons. As it is not compulsory, parents have the option to withdraw their children from this by submitting a written request and talking to Miss May or Mrs McGoldrick.

We have always taught RHSCE to our children at Littledean C of E Primary School as this is part of a wider programme of personal, social and health education, which includes lessons throughout the year on topics such as anti-bullying, online safety, keeping our bodies fit and healthy, healthy friendships, keeping safe and many more.
