School staff

We lose some valued staff members this year: Zoe Haynes, Sarah Crowell-Hall, Rachel Orchard and Emma Tattersall, you will all be sorely missed and we wish you success and best wishes for the future. Elaine Blake also left during the school year and we wish her good luck for the future.

Suzanne Webb and Wendy Worgan have both been awarded long service awards from Gloucestershire County Council for 25 years' service at the Local Authority.

Governors

Governors have been busy reviewing and auditing our skills and evaluating our compliance with statutory and other requirements. Previously we considered all business as a full board in meetings. This became too onerous so this year we have moved to a sub-committee structure (Leadership; Curriculum; and Staffing) allowing more time for sub-committees to analyse and evaluate key elements of school management. We continue to visit the school regularly, have subject leader presentations in governor meetings and have conducted safeguarding training as part of our continuous professional development. We have also done a lot of work analysing our finances using Department of Education benchmarking tools. Schools in the local

area are currently in a challenging situation with falling pupil numbers (a result of demographic changes) affecting finances, not easy to manage during a 'cost of living crisis'. The leadership and management governors have therefore had to take the difficult decision to review class structure and to reduce teaching staff for the next school year.

Pauline Rea-Dickins resigned as community governor. We thank her for all her efforts in support of the school and offer her our best wishes for the future.

Wraparound care: breakfast club and pre-school

The breakfast club ran for 4 weeks but unfortunately actual did not reflect anticipated demand, so was suspended: we will continue to keep this as an option for the future. On a more positive note the **pre-school will be restarting in September** led by Mrs Powell. An **enormous** thank you to those unsung heroes who helped get this going as it has always been an important part of Littledean School.

New governors?

School inspections

We have had our SIAMS (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools) and Ofsted inspections in the past year. Whilst challenging, these offer useful external scrutiny, another pair of official eyes, to evaluate how we are all doing. Whatever the outcomes of these inspections, we as Governors have 100% confidence in the team at Littledean School to respond positively and they have already done so. The results give only one snap shot assessment of your children's capabilities: we can see for ourselves every day what bright shining stars they all are.

Ofsted

Whilst we have retained our 'good' grade the inspectors highlighted areas to be worked on before their next visit: a renewed focus on phonics; a curriculum review to ensure knowledge is built sequentially and pupils learn well; and supplementary monitoring and assessment to evaluate the impact of learning. These were things that had already been identified by the school and included in the School Development Plan. Nevertheless, it is helpful to have some external reinforcement of the issues to galvanise action, for example:

- Phonics development with input from the Mangotsfield English hub
 https://www.mangotsfieldprimary.org/Our-School/English-Hub/ (new resources, staff training, targeted guided reading and other support, action plans, monitoring, book swap in the back playground shelter)
- All classes have been doing a weekly handwriting lesson with moderation of writing and a staff meeting discussion about barriers
- Curriculum review so that now the school is largely using produced schemes of work which
 have a proven track record of good coverage and clear progression of skills and knowledge,
 for example:

Overall there is a **renewed focus on high expectation and standards** in school and governors are working hard to support all the work that is going on to support children in their learning and development.

Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS)

Our SIAMS rating remains as "good" with the inspector reporting amongst other things that "the well-established Christian vision is at the heart of this school and clearly enables pupils and adults to flourish". Again there is always room for improvement so the report recommended that assessment systems and curriculum need some review and refinement. Hayley McGoldrick is already working with Debbie Helme from the Gloucestershire Diocese to create a plan of action.

We also had a visit from the Bishop's Visitor, Angela Anderton who was very impressed and supportive of all that the school and wider community does.

School collaboration and Multi-academy trusts (MAT)

Littledean school has been a long standing member and leader of the West Gloucestershire Schools Partnership (WGSP): https://wgsp.education/ and will continue to be so. This is a strong cohesive partnership which provides support and development to all staff and governors within 39 primary schools in the Forest of Dean and surrounding areas, and includes the Gloucester and Forest Alternative Provision School and the Heart of the Forest Special School.

However a staff and governors working party has been created to investigate the options, process and rationale for collaborating with other schools within a more informal or formal structure for example a federation or academy trust. We have had a presentation from a governor whose school has become part of a trust, attended a Diocese of Gloucester conference on Trusts, and are working with some different MATs to evaluate the pros and cons. This is in part a response to government policy, changes in the organisation of schools locally, ongoing financial and resource pressures, but mainly a desire to retain some control of our future and to be prepared for any eventuality. We are very early on in the process and a lot more work is needed – we believe that the Littledean School community is really special and we want to keep it that way but adapt to changing circumstances.

This work does <u>not</u> mean we are in the process of becoming a Trust or part of one! We are just looking at our options as a school


